MINISTRY WANTS TO BUY PROPERTIES

Annington Homes is currently involved in the early stages of a legal battle with the Government over the future of its military homes portfolio.

Annington has a portfolio.

Annington has a portfolio of 38,000 military properties including 3,044 in Yorkshire.

The Government originally sold off 55,000 properties in

1996 for £1.7bn but a number of the leases have been returned since then.

The company said earlier this year that the Ministry of Defence and UK Government Investments, the state's investing arm, are now seeking to forcibly buy back the remaining properties.
